Besides **University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences (BOKU)**, Vienna and Austria have a lot to offer.

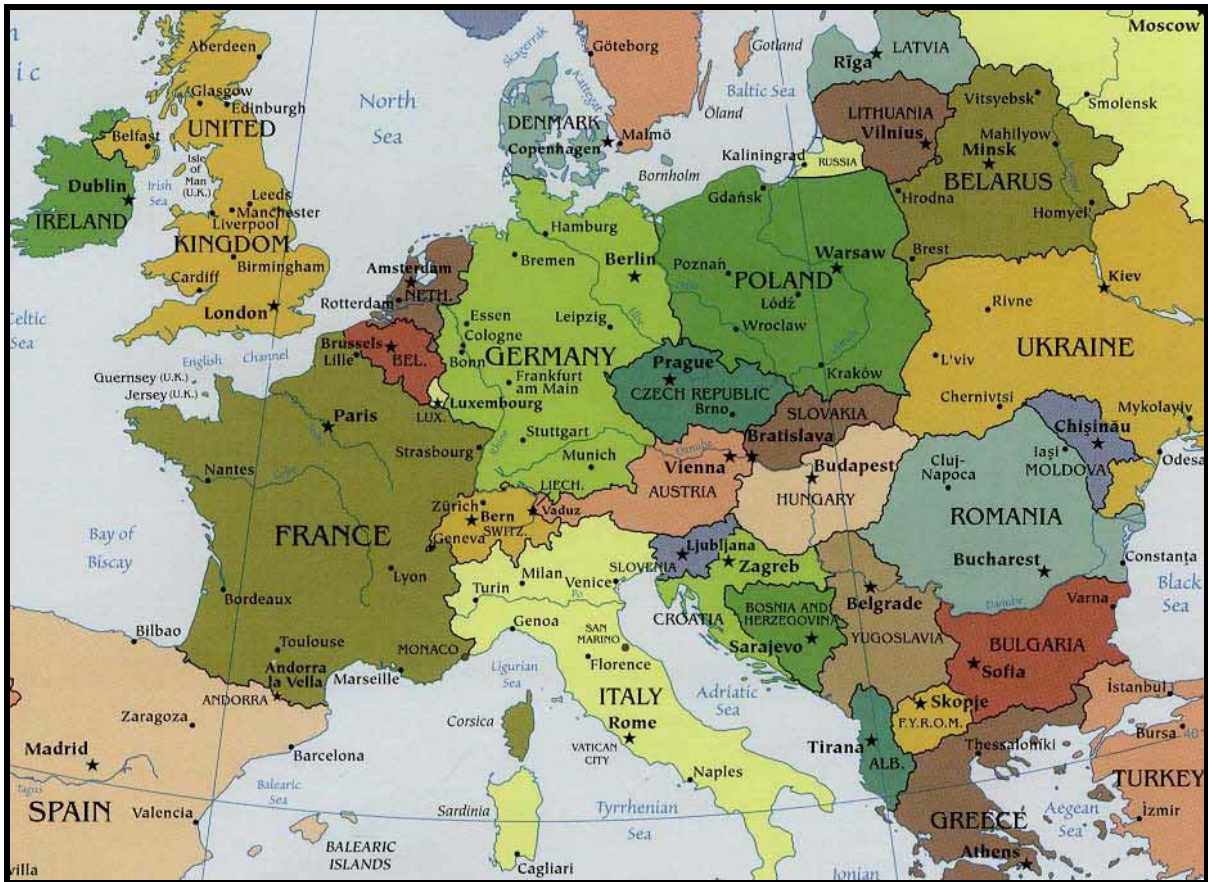
With its history, its cultural traditions, and its location in the centre of Europe right on the borderline between East and West, Vienna should be of special interest for any student especially from overseas.

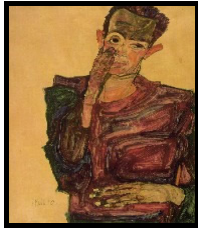

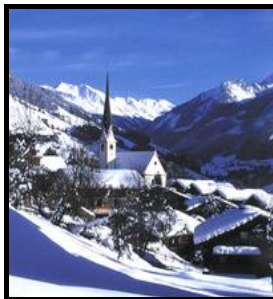

Interesting Facts for the International Exchange Student at BOKU

For the international student who wants to study at BOKU, the following facts are of special interest:

- 98% of Austria's waste water is treated in sewage treatment plants → Waste water treatment is an important part of BSc and MSc "Environmental Engineering".



- The public transport system of Vienna is one of the best in the world → Find courses about Traffic Planning and Traffic Management at BOKU's "Institute for Transport Studies".



- There are no nuclear power plants in Austria. Most energy is generated with hydro-electric power plants → Lectures in the field of Water Resource Planning and Water Management are given at the "Institute of Water Management, Hydrology and Hydraulic Engineering".



- Austria has the highest percentage of organic farmers within the European Union → BOKU offers the MSc "Organic Farming".



- 45% of the total area of Austria is used for agriculture → BOKU offers programmes at undergraduate and graduate levels: "Agriculture", "Organic Farming", "Applied Plant Sciences", "Horticulture Sciences" (English MSc), "Livestock Sciences", and "Agricultural Biology".



- Austria has an age long tradition of wine production and is an important exporter of wine. → BOKU offers a BSc in "Viticulture, Oenology and Wine Marketing".



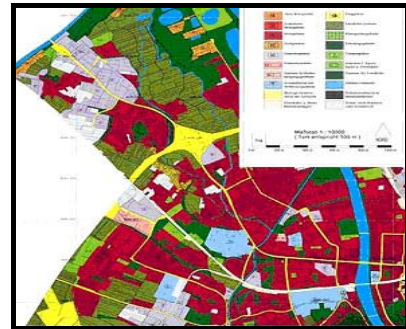
- 2/3rds of the Austria's surface is covered by mountains → programmes at BOKU: English MSc "Mountain Forestry", and English MSc "Mountain Risk Engineering", also MSc "Wildlife Ecology and Wildlife Management".



- 40% of Austria is covered by forests. Forestry is an important part of Austria's economy → programmes at BOKU: BSc and MSc "Forestry", MSc "Mountain Forestry" (English MSc), "Wood and Fibre Technology", and "Wood Technology and Management".



- With the changes in society in the second half of the 20th century and the migration towards urban centres, it became more and more important to foster research for a sustainable rural development → Find lectures in this field at the "Institute of Spatial Planning and Rural Development".



- Tourism is a highly important source of Austria's income. → Find courses at the "Institute of Landscape Development, Recreation and Conservation Planning", or BSc and MSc "Landscape Architecture and Planning".



- Austria is one of the countries with the highest percentage of recycling of used materials. Austrian citizens have a high awareness of the limitations of natural resources. BOKU Vienna is taking on the challenge to play a role in securing and consciously using our natural life resources. BOKU offers → BSc and MSc "Environmental and Bio Resources Management", and also MSc "Natural Resources Management and Ecological Engineering".



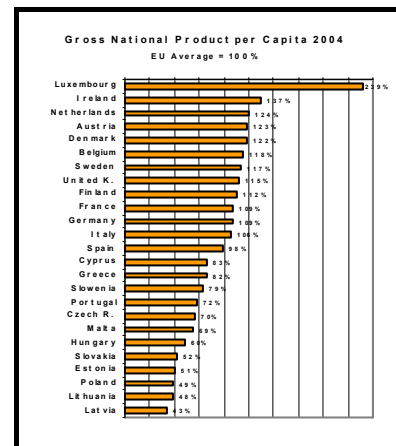
- Healthy and safe food is basic for our health and well-being. BOKU offers programmes at graduate and undergraduate level: → BSc and MSc "Food Science and Bio Technology", MSc "Bio-Technology", and MSc "Safety in the Food Chain".



- University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences, Vienna, is one of the leading Centres of Bio-Technology in Europe. → Lectures are offered at the “Institute of Applied Microbiology”, at the “Center for NanoBiotechnology”, and at the “Interuniversitarian Department for Agro-Biotechnology – IFA Tulln”.



- A prosperous and sustainable economy secures Austria’s high standard of living. → Find courses about Sustainable Economic Development, Environmental and Natural Resource Policy, Agricultural and Forestry Economics, Business Administration, and Marketing at the Department of Economics and Social Sciences. BOKU also offers an MSc “Agronomics and Food Economy”.



Types of Courses at BOKU

In order to guarantee a profound and high quality education, BOKU offers different types of courses:

- lecture = Vorlesung (VO): teacher talks, possibilities for student-questions
- seminar = Seminar (SE): special and profound lecture; sometimes project work or reports are required
- exercises = Uebungen (UE) practical exercises; labs;
- excursion = Exkursion (EX) field trip
- practical course = Praktikum (PR) practical course; lab
- project work = Projektarbeit (PJ) project work or group work

There can also be combinations of different types of courses, e.g.:

- lecture + seminar (VS)
- lecture + exercises (VU)
- lecture + excursion (VX)
- lecture + practical exercises + excursion (VY or VZ)

Studying at an Austrian University

Studying at Austrian universities is very different from studying at English-speaking universities. The students are rather free in what courses they take and how many courses they take. For many courses attendance is not obligatory – for some, seminars and practical courses, it is.

Thus, it really depends on the level of student-responsibility and on how much progress the students want to make in their field of study.

Courses vary in terms of workload. 30 ECTS credit points are considered a full workload per semester for Austrian students. Of course, students are allowed to do more than that. Depending on the workload required, a full semester can comprise between 7 and 10 courses. International exchange students have to follow the requirements of their home university.

The way courses are scheduled here, is quite different from English-speaking countries. Students are not necessarily in the courses five days a week. Some courses are blocked, so students may meet only for 3 or 4 days but for 6 to 7 hours at a time.

Your Experience

A study abroad semester at BOKU Vienna offers excellent and rewarding fields of study and the chance to broaden one's knowledge, as well as living an international student life in a highly interesting environment.

Therefore, for a Central European experience and the chance to study at one of Europe's best universities for natural resources and applied life sciences, BOKU Vienna is the optimal choice.

Location: BOKU has two main locations, both situated in the northern part of Vienna where the hills of the Vienna Woods begin:

-  Location BOKU Campus at Türkenschanze / Peter-Jordan Straße
-  Location Muthgasse

Public Transport to BOKU

- **Bus Line 40A → for BOKU Campus at “Türkenschanze”**
This line connects the city centre (leaving at “Schottentor”) and the U6 (“Währinger Straße” station) with Gregor-Mendel-House (main building) – “Linnéplatz” stop – and with the ZIB and other departmental buildings at the “Dänenstraße” stop.
- **Bus Line 37A → for BOKU Campus at “Türkenschanze”**
This connects the U4 (“Spittelau” stop) and the U6 (“Nußdorfer Straße” stop) with the BOKU campus (stop “Linnéplatz” or “Dänenstraße”).
- **Bus Line 10A → connects “Türkenschanze” with “Muthgasse”**
This line connects the S-Bahn (“Gersthof” or “Heiligenstadt” stops) and the U4 (“Heiligenstadt” stop) with the BOKU buildings. Furthermore, it also connects the BOKU campus at Türkenschanze with the buildings at Muthgasse (transfer to bus line 11A at “Heiligenstadt” station or use the pedestrian terminal towards “Muthgasse”).
- **Underground U4 → for the buildings at “Muthgasse”**
At the final stop at “Heiligenstadt” use the pedestrian terminal to “Muthgasse”.

ZIB – Center for International Relations

Welcome Days

Take place in the first week of each semester – Information at ZIB.

Buddy Network

ZIB promotes the exchange of Austrian and international students through a buddy network. The buddy will be very helpful especially at the beginning to facilitate the first couple of steps in Vienna. When the students move into their new room and have to deal with Austrian and BOKU administration. He/she can introduce the international student to Viennese university life, help to get accustomed to BOKU and show a side of Vienna and Austria a foreigner would probably not discover otherwise.

Dean's Office

Admission (enrolment) as a student at BOKU takes place at the "Studienabteilung" (Dean's Office). You can find the Dean's Office in the 2nd floor of Mendel-House.

German Courses

- BOKU offers an "Intensive German Refreshing Course – Intermediate Level" and an "Intensive German Course – Beginners" before the semester starts (2 weeks)
- German courses at different levels are offered during the academic year.

Visa Information

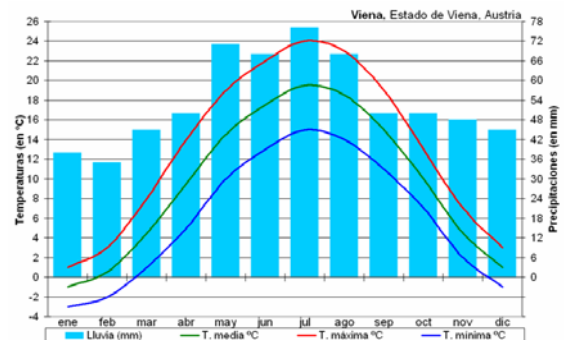
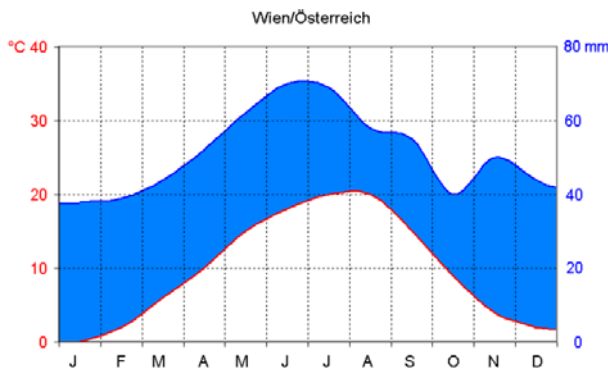
- EU-citizens do not need visas.

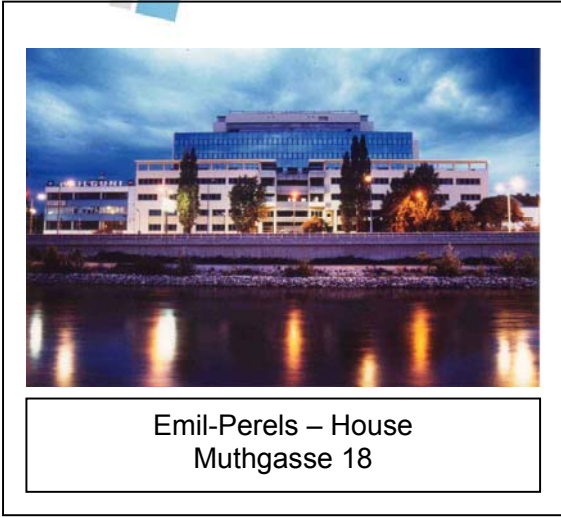
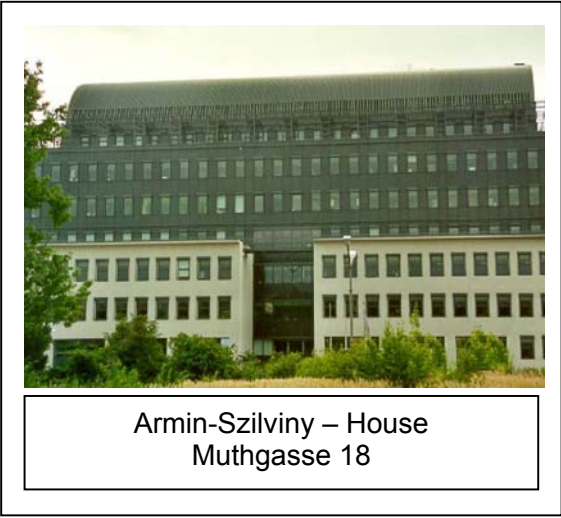
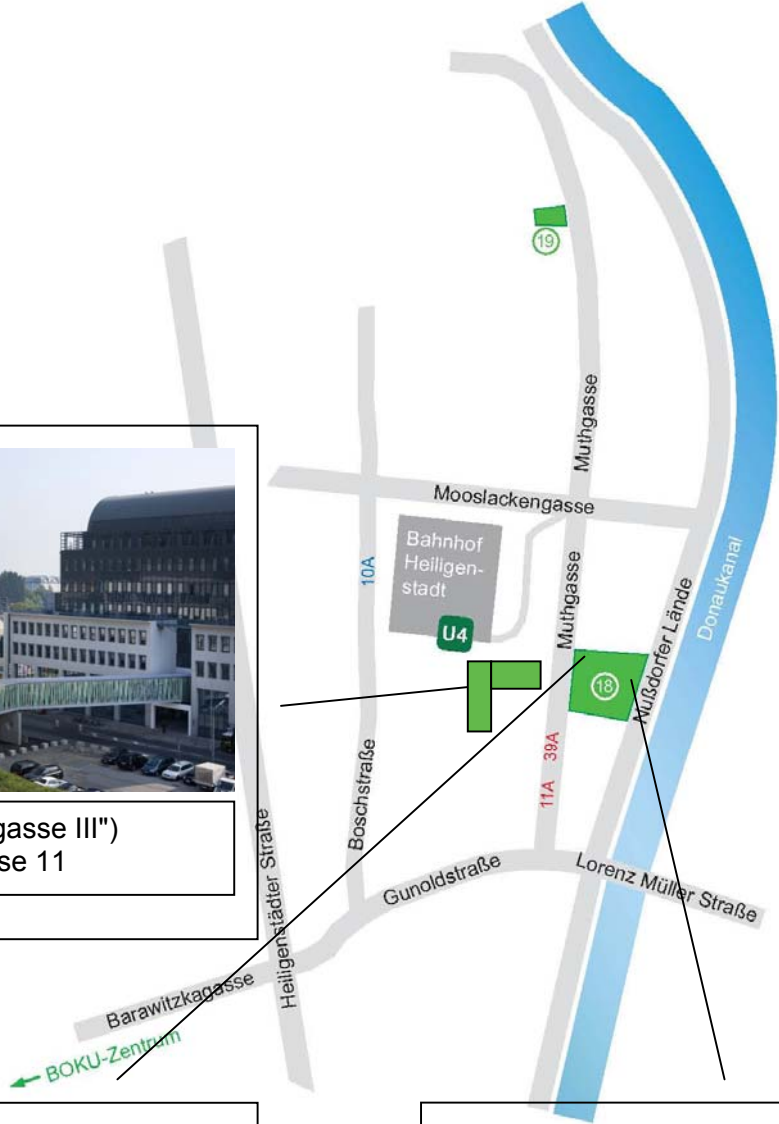


- Public Transport in Vienna
Vienna has a great public transport system. Its 117 lines – underground, tram, bus – plus the local trains (S-Bahn) can take you easily to every place. Additionally, there are night buses running every half an hour when the underground is closed. International students get semester tickets for just €128.50.

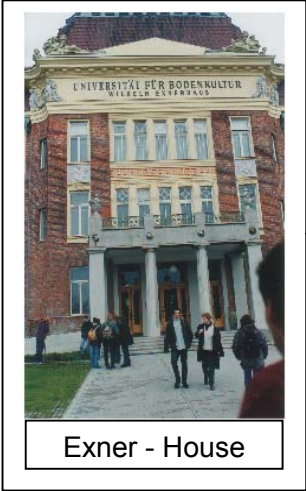

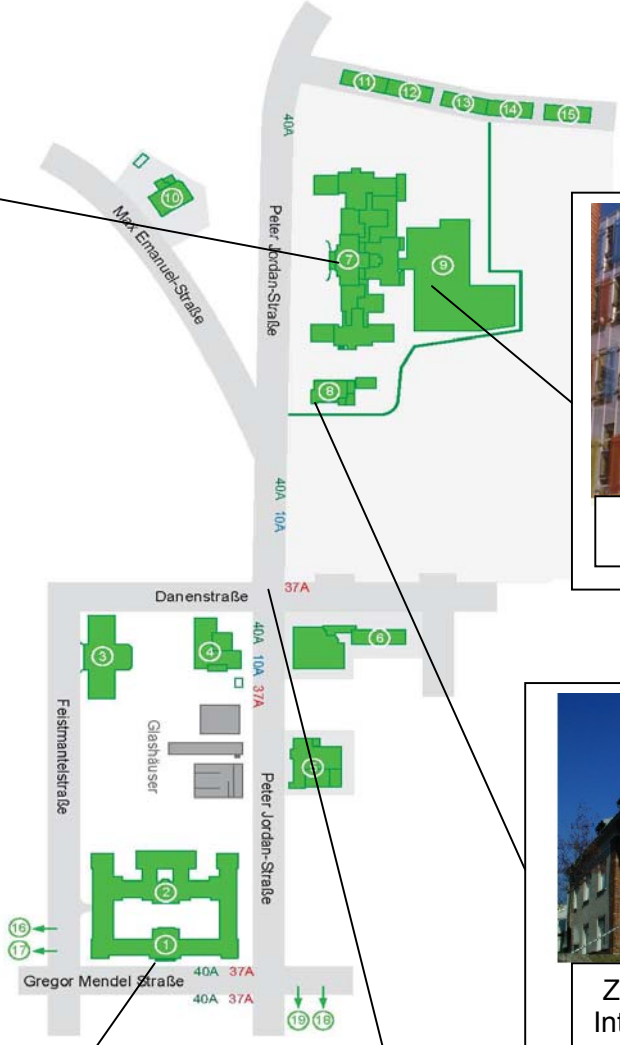
Map of BOKU Muthgasse
