General Report

Attended lectures:

Environmental policy and planning ERST630:

Mandatory lecture, I liked the policy part, as we learned a lot about New Zealand's politics as well, the planning part was a little dry. If you have never had any planning course before, it was quite hard to connect and identify the relevance of the topics. I think that the ECOL608 Research methods in ecology would be better suited to be mandatory for our study programme, as it provides a lot knowledge that most of us can use for our Master Thesis and how it is to work in a scientific field. (even though it is mostly taught by ecologists, the focus is mainly on the research methods and they use just examples from ecology that can be applied to most fields).

Research methods in ecology ECOL608:

The lecture consists of a statistics part where you get a really deep introduction to R. It is actually helpful if you worked with R before, but it works also if you didn't. The second part focuses on how it is to work as a scientists - how to get research funds, how to talk to the media/public about your research, etc.

Plant and crop physiology PLSC611A:

Be aware this is an online course. It was great if you want to get a deeper knowledge on how crops develop in the field and what they need. There was a complementary bachelor's course the lecturers told us about, so I also attended this one. The topics overlapped but it was nice to be taught in person as well rather than just reading on your own. But the lecturers also did an online meeting after every module and there they explained the topics and you could ask whatever questions you had. A lot of assignments were included, which was very helpful for studying.

If you have any problems with the work load or the assignments during the semester, I highly recommend that you ask your lecturers for help or extended deadlines. The assignments can be phrased quite complicated, so ask if you are not sure what they want from you.

What did you gain the most out of your stay abroad?

New friends and new insights to life as we were all from different places. It was a great environment for studying and to get to know fellow students and discuss upcoming topics. Experiencing the country together with friends, going on many adventures and improving my professional knowledge and language skills.

Which particular piece of advice would you give interested students?

I would highly recommend to spend time with your fellow students. There are a lot of study spaces on campus where you can hang and get to meet people. Join the clubs, there is a club market where several clubs are offered.

Also I recommend to get a car, otherwise it is hard to really get to know the country. There is a company called Turners Cars in Christchurch, where you can buy cars and they check everything for you in advance. If you are unable to sell the car, you can sell it back to them for 50%. But normally, you shouldn't have a problem with selling a car there. There are always new students coming that are interested in buying a car.

Stay a little longer than just your semester if possible. The workload can be quite intense and you might have not that much time to experience the country. While travelling be sure to check out the website of the Department of Conservation. They built a lot of nice huts and campgrounds in the most beautfiul places.CamperMate is also an app that I can highly recommend.

The best tip that I can give you if you are unsatisfied with a situation or you need help, just ask. The people at LU are very helpful and want to find a solution with you.
