Eligible projects may include:

- non-destructive investigation and/or excavation of a site or a garden component of a site
- materials analyses

• Surveying or photographing monuments and objects that are at risk, e.g. gardens, architecture, mosaics, and sculptures in situ

The range of awards is \$3,000–\$10,000.
