## 1. City, country and people + social integration

I studied for a semester in the beautiful small city Granada. Granada is located in Andalucia, close to Sierra Nevada, a mountain chain, and to the sea. The location is perfect if you like to hike but also to swim as you can reach the sea within 1 hour. The people in Granada are very open and friendly.

I studied at the Universidad de Granada. In my courses where some other Erasmus students and I became friends with them. My classmates at university where in general a bit younger than I am and they stayed more in there friend circles. In the End the international students could choose between doing the exam or writing a thesis.

   In the beginning I struggled with understanding the professor as he had a really strong Andalusian dialect but after some weeks I got used to it. You need to complete two exams and reach over 50%. Really interesting course!
