7. Host country

The most important step after being accepted for the Joint Study Program was to figure out VISA requirements. Exchange students have to get a J1-visa to enter the US (https://travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/us-visas/study/exchange.html). I started about 2 months prior to my departure with preparations. The people in the US are very welcoming to Europeans and it was easy to get to know them. Coming here one has to consider that the USA is culturally different; one big disadvantage as an exchange student is the car culture - without a car it was difficult to get around. Florida in general is known for sunny days, their alligators, the springs (going kayaking or tubing there is highly recommended) and their beaches (the closest beach is about 1,5 hours away).

8. Host university

The city of Gainesville is all about the University of Florida and their gators (GO gators! https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Florida_Gators). The campus is considered the center of Gainesville and contains about 900 buildings. Therefore, buses operate (for UF students for free) to connect the routes (GNVRideRTS app). However, having a bike was helpful for me to also explore other places. UF has three important websites: our BOKUlearn is their Canvas (Canvas student app), our BOKUmail is the gatormail and our BOKUonline is their ONE.UF. The campus is very beautiful with a lot of nature. Campus food and the surrounding restaurants and supermarkets are very expensive so it is worth it to either drive to the supermarkets further away (Trader Joe and Walmart at Butler Plaza) or order food from Aldi (first orders are free).

Upon arrival the Dean of my College - the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (https://www.eng.ufl.edu/surf/contacts/cals/) - registered me for courses and helped out with the course selection. Financal support was coming from the Joint Study Program (about 2500€ once). Working in the USA with the visa is only allowed on campus and upon acceptance by the International Center of UF. Therefore, it is recommended to have some savings to spend as well.							
13. Can you give advice and suggestions regarding the social aspect of your host country/university (cultural differences, importance of language ability etc.)?							
The people I met in the US were mostly very talkative and social. I was thankful to get to a country where everyone is welcoming and also trying to be your friend and help you out (asking you to give a ride, inviting you to their home quickly). Another difference already mentioned is the car culture. Going for a walk is mostly done in a small designated area or park and not in the city itself. Going for groceries or restaurants is mostly done by car, due to less expanded public transport. English is spoken everywhere and it is important to understand it to a high level. Discussions in class are highly encouraged and it is important to be able to participate. Furthermore reading skills and technical vocabulary are very important, since a big part of classes is understanding research paper.

25. Did you have any problems during your stay abroad?

My stay in the US was instructive on a personal and professional level. I have not been to the US before, so the culture differences were all new to me and I had a fun time exploring and seeing new things. Florida in general is a beautiful and sunny place for studying. I would recommend to visit places nearby: the springs (tubing at Ichetuknee river is a great weekend activity), beaches in St. Augustine, Jacksonville and Tampa and towns like Cedar Key. However, be aware that all of these daytrips are only possible by car!

I took three courses from the CALS institute at UF for my graduate program: Plant Biochemistry, Plant Genomes and Genetics and Advanced Microbial Ecology. All the courses were demanding and I learned a lot. I will be able to transfer the credits of the courses as specializations and free electives. The grading of the courses was very generous and it helped to be in classes and participate. The dean of the CALS institute also showed as the research center nearby and invited us for dinner. That excursion was very insightful and a great addition to my stay abroad.

Food at campus can get quite expensive and is often not vegan/vegetratian and if you are not too much into food prepping - I can recommend Krishna lunch (https://krishnalunch.com/).

As mentioned before I had troubles with my accomodation and a lot of other people were unhappy with their choice. I would recommend to get a short term accomodation first and then visit the place in person or gather a lot of information on the place first (Weaver Hall is a student dorm right on campus for international students and in general people were happy to live there for reasons of being included in the international community).

The last two questions

What did you gain the most out of your stay abroad?

I got a new perspective on academics and on life in general. It is always interesting to meet people with different backgrounds and life stories and learn from them. I had to present myself during lectures which made me more confident giving presentations. I also learned to appreciate certain aspects of Austria that were just natural for me (public transport, health insurance and healthy food options). In addition, I met a lot of amazing people from Europe and all over the world and now I always have friends to visit when I feel like traveling.

Which particular piece of advice would you give interested students?

Inform yourself, but not too much and just enjoy the stay! It can get more expensive than expected (I had to change flat and it cost me an extra month of rent), so it is recommended to have enough savings to enjoy the stay without having to worry too much about money.
